About the NCTJ

The NCTJ runs the premier training scheme for journalists in the UK.

NCTJ accreditation is the hallmark of excellence in journalism training, providing a world-class industry standard that is recognised throughout the media.

The NCTJ accredits more than 50 journalism courses at universities, colleges and independent training centres in the UK. The courses are delivered both part-time and full-time over periods ranging from four months to four years.

Diploma in Journalism

All students on accredited courses study for the NCTJ Level 5 Diploma in Journalism, which is recognised as the industry standard qualification for entry-level journalists.

The qualification prepares students for the demands of working as a trainee journalist, gaining the skills they need to work across all sectors of the media.

Students who receive a grade of F (0-29 per cent) in any diploma subject will not be awarded credits for that module but can be offered the opportunity to re-sit the assessment.



Next steps – National Qualification in Journalism

Once students are employed as trainee journalists, usually with a 'gold standard' diploma, they will also be eligible to progress to the NCTJ's professional qualification, the Level 6 National Qualification in Journalism (NQJ).

This is usually taken after 18 months' employment to qualify as a senior journalist.
